LAW FOUNDATION OF NOVA SCOTIA

Annual Report, 2000-2001

The Law Foundation of Nova Scotia was created by an amendment to the Barristers and Solicitors Act in 1976. The objects of the Foundation are "to establish and maintain a fund to be used for the examination, research, revision and reform of and public access to the law, legal education, the administration of justice in the Province and other purposes incidental or conducive to or consequential upon the attainment of any such objects." The fund is derived from the interest on lawyers' general trust accounts, which is paid by the banks and trust companies to the Foundation.

The Law Foundation benefited from a strong economy and favourable interest rates in 2000-2001. The Law Foundation's income from interest on lawyers' trust accounts for 2000-2001 was \$1,935,955. Interest income in 1999-2000 was \$1,425,369.

The Law Foundation maintained or increased core funding to long-time grantees and awarded five new project grants and three, 3-year grants. In honour of the millennium, the Foundation solicited applications for special funding for one-time projects fulfilling the mandate of the Law Foundation. The Foundation sought projects that would be innovative, or make a significant contribution to the operation of the applicant organization or be of enduring benefit to the community. Approval was granted to four projects. The Law Foundation was pleased to fund innovative projects that assisted in the administration of justice in the province or provided access to legal information and services by disadvantaged members of society.

The Law Foundation of Nova Scotia set up a reserve fund in 1986 to maintain grants in periods of low interest rates when current income is insufficient to funds regular grants. Similar reserves are held by almost all Canadian law foundations. Since March 1998 the reserve has been managed by an investment management firm. As of March 31, 2001 the reserve amounted to \$1,686,716. This fund was drawn upon several years ago when interest rates dropped so that certain core grants could be maintained.

The prime interest rate has continued to decline in the winter and spring of 2001. While interest rates are dropping, the Law Foundation has sufficient cash in hand to fund all current grants. We look forward to providing funding for meaningful projects and organizations within the mandate of the Foundation. *
