LAW FOUNDATION OF NOVA SCOTIA

Annual Report, 2001-2002

The Law Foundation of Nova Scotia was created by an amendment to the Barristers and Solicitors Act in 1976. The objects of the Foundation are "to establish and maintain a fund to be used for the examination, research, revision and reform of and public access to the law, legal education, the administration of justice in the Province and other purposes incidental or conducive to or consequential upon the attainment of any such objects." The fund is derived from the interest on lawyers' general trust accounts, which is paid by the banks and trust companies to the Foundation.

The Board of Governors welcomed Kerry Oliver to the position of Executive Director on October 29th, 2001.

The prime rate of interest dropped from 6.75% to 3.75% between March 2001 and January 2002. The decline in the interest rate had a significant impact on the Law Foundation's annual revenue. Income from interest on lawyers' trust accounts for 2001-2002 was \$1,159,925 – down from \$1,935,955 in 2000-2001.

Despite the drop in revenue, the Law Foundation had sufficient cash in hand to fund most current grants. The Foundation discontinued funding to one grantee, but maintained core funding to all other long-time grantees, and awarded one new core-funding grant. It also awarded three new project grants.

The Foundation established a reserve fund in 1986 to maintain grants in periods of low interest rates when current income is insufficient to fund regular grants. Most other Canadian law foundations hold similar reserves. The reserve is managed by an investment management firm, and as of March 31, 2002, it amounted to \$2,000,075.

Periods of low interest rates present the Board of Governors with the challenge of maintaining core grants while at the same time protecting the Foundation's financial position. The 40% drop in revenue during 2001-2002 and the anticipation of reduced revenue in 2002-2003 will be reflected in the Foundation's grants budget for 2003-2004. The Foundation has given one year's notice to a number of worthy organizations that their funding will be discontinued for the year commencing April 2003. The Board will also consider whether to make further adjustments in grant levels and whether to draw upon the reserve fund to maintain certain grants.
