Annual Report 2003-2004

The Law Foundation of Nova Scotia was created by an amendment to the Barristers and Solicitors Act in 1976.

MANDATE

The objects of the Foundation are "to establish and maintain a fund to be used for the examination, research, revision and reform of and public access to the law, legal education, the administration of justice in the Province and other purposes incidental or conducive to or consequential upon the attainment of any such objects."

Since it was created, the Foundation has paid out more than \$20 million in grants. The revenue generated from trust account interest has supported over 250 organizations involved in a wide variety of programs and projects benefiting the people of Nova Scotia.

REVENUE

The Law Foundation derives its revenue from the interest on lawyers' general trust accounts. The Foundation has arrangements with financial institutions for payment of interest at varying rates.

The prime rate of interest hit a low of 3.75% in January 2002, but by April 2003, it had bounced back to 5%. The rate fell again in July 2003, and as of the date of this report, it was 4%. All indications point to another drop in the prime rate in the second quarter of the year.

The increase in the prime rate early in the year, combined with renegotiated agreements with Scotiabank, CIBC and TD Canada Trust, resulted in an increase in revenue. Income from interest on lawyers' trust accounts for 2003-2004 was \$1,206,674, an increase of 54% over last year's income of \$781,777.

If the prime rate remains at 4% or drops to 3.75% in 2004-2005, the Foundation will see a significant drop in revenue once again.

NEGOTIATIONS WITH FINANCIAL INSTITUTIONS

Last year, the Foundation was pleased to report more favourable agreements had been negotiated with Scotiabank, CIBC and TD Canada Trust. This year, we began negotiations with the Royal Bank but to date, there is no new agreement to report.

RESERVE FUND

The Foundation established a reserve fund in 1986 to maintain grants in periods of low interest rates when current income is insufficient to fund regular grants. Most other Canadian law foundations hold similar reserves.

At the beginning of the fiscal year, the reserve fund had a cost and market value of \$1,963,183 and \$1,664,166 respectively. As of March 31, 2004, it had a total cost of \$2,008,178 and a market value of \$2,189,406. During the 2003/4 fiscal year, dividends, interest, realized gains and unrealized appreciation totaled approximately \$526,000, net of management fees.

GRANTS

Law Foundation Scholarship Fund

The Law Foundation established a trust fund in 1981 with an initial grant of \$200,000, to provide scholarships to students attending Dalhousie Law School. There have been several

contributions to the fund over the years. The fund currently supports seven scholarships for students entering first year and up to eight scholarships for students in both second and third years. The fund also supports fellowships at the graduate level. In 2003-2004, 22 students were awarded scholarships totalling \$181,000.00.

• 2003-2004 Grants

The Foundation paid out grants of \$1,230,000 in 2002-2003. The Board reduced the grants budget to approximately \$950,000 in 2003-2004 to counter the effects of the 40% drop in revenue during 2001 - 2002 and the 33% drop in revenue in 2002 - 2003. Despite the reduction in the grants budget, the Foundation had to use funds from its operating reserves to meet grant commitments in 2003-2004. The grants budget will remain the same in 2004-2005.
